People saw the sign. And they came.

Folks who could not get to work used the library as a business space, working on computers, making calls and e-mailing associates. I have vivid memories of a woman pacing the hallway outside my office as she made call after call. Some people came to warm up and power up. People came prepared with multiple devices – laptop computers, cell phones, electronic games – and their own power strips. Some came to contact insurance companies, others to get in touch with families and friends, letting them know they were okay. Parents came with children to read, play and pass the time.

Every outlet, every table was in use. Everything that could be a seat was a seat, including step stools and the floor. People clustered around columns with outlets, and at outlets at the ends of halls and in corners that I didn't know existed.

Most of all, you could see the diversity of this community in the library: all ages, stages and ethnicities.

At one point I can remember thinking, "This is the way it is supposed to be."

Your library staff did a fabulous job welcoming everyone, helping them to find seats and places to plug in, making them feel like valued patrons instead of refugees. Early in my employ here in Bergenfield, I noticed the signs that read "Bergenfield, a Friendly Town." We were the Friendly Library That Could in those days following the storm. Thank you for helping us with your generous donations and support to make it so.
